

The rewards include fieldtrips, and on campus events such as movies, karaoke and games! The requirements to be in the Cats Club are shown below.

- * Must have an 80 or above average in each class
- * Cannot have more than 2 unexcused absences
- * No suspensions, no ISS, no DAEP or referrals
- * Cannot have more than 3 tardies

Cats Club serves as a way for students to try their best to be involved in these school activities. Students who do not qualify for these activities will remain in the school and continue with their regular schedule throughout the day. Some trips will include costs, such as food and drinks, traveling, and entrance fees. If you make the requirements for the Cats Club, you will be given a permission slip, with a lunch order form, and event information. There are no exceptions, the paperwork must be signed with a parent signature, including the money that is required. If an eligible student chooses not to attend an event or activity, the student will be able to stay behind, and continue with their regular class schedule. However, schedule may be modified to accommodate.

The first fieldtrip has been announced to take place at the Rockin' K Farms on Wednesday, October 24 for 6th graders, and Friday October 26th for 7-8th grade.




