GermBlast

What is GermBlast? Alton Alexander, Director of Maintenance and Operations for G-PISD, shared this information with us:

I am in charge of taking care of all the facilities throughout the district - repairing and maintaining anything and everything at your school and all the other buildings and properties that belong to G-PISD: Things like the air conditioning, the heating, the lights, the restrooms, the roof, painting, the parking lots, the gyms, cutting the grass, trimming the trees and plants, and things like that.

GermBlast is the name of a business which is located in Lubbock, Texas; you can look them up on the web. They are hired to come down here and spray an antimicrobial product throughout the district. They send a crew of about 10 people to go through and treat all the facilities in the district and all the buses. The treatment is quarterly - which means once every 4 months.

How do they treat the facilities? The crew goes in every single room and wipes all surfaces down with disinfectant wipes - all desks, tables, chairs, key boards, all hard surfaces that you touch. Then they come into the room with a machine that sprays out a mist; this is the antimicrobial product. The mist is statically charged and it is attracted to the surfaces. So, it basically puts a light coat all over everything in the room. This product is not a poison or an antiseptic or anything like that. If you use a microscope and look at the film left behind, it forms a bunch of tinny spiked and sharp edges. We cannot feel it and it does not do anything to us, but to a microorganism, it is like landing on and crawling through a huge field on giant glass spikes.

We have GermBlast to reduce the likelihood of students and teachers getting sick. We have all learned that we get sick from germs and a germ is nothing more than a little microscopic organism. We spread and pick up germs every time we sneeze, cough, wipe our nose or mouth, touch something, and actions such as that. So, as germs are spread around and they come in contact with the spikes left behind by the spray treatment, they are literally punctured and cut up so they die. If the germ is destroyed, then it can't be picked up by someone else and get them sick too. You may ask "Why does the school care if I am sick?" GPISD prides itself on providing the best learning opportunity that they can. If a student is out sick, then they are not in class learning. If a teacher is out sick, then the students are not receiving instruction from their regular teacher, which negatively impacts the students' learning as well.

Q: How have our numbers been like so far?


A: Our numbers have been pretty good so far. I read the numbers on the announcements to make people aware of our attendance and the importance of it.







Awesome Tanks 2 is a very challenging game with 15 levels, getting harder as you go. (Hint: The Railgun maxed out is the best to have!!!




can get along with the 8th graders, why can't we get along with the 6th graders?" So therefore, we should all be together and not be separated.
