
Freerice has two main goals:

Students can be in as many classes that they need to be in. Teachers can have multiple classes and have them open to any number of students. Teachers can create assignments, polls, regular posts, or small questions. When students want to open an assignment, they have the option to make a regular text document, Word document, Powerpoint, or an Excel wordbook.
